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## **FACT** Employment First Doesn't Mean Employment Only

"Employment First" is a growing movement both nationally and in Massachusetts. There are now 38 states with an Employment First policy, including Massachusetts. The vision for Employment First, according to the Association of People Supporting Employment First (APSE), is that "Employment in the general workforce is the first and preferred outcome in the provision of publicly funded services for all working age citizens with disabilities, regardless of level of disability."

The Massachusetts Department of Developmental Services' Employment First Policy, signed in 2010, similarly states that "for working age adults served by [DDS], integrated, individual employment is the preferred service option and optimal outcome." Since 2013, DDS has been working to make this shift. From 2013 to 2019 the number of people supported by DDS in individual integrated employment increased from about 1,700 to 2,500. In 2016 the use of sheltered work was eliminated as a publicly-funded option.

#### What is integrated, individual employment, according to the DDS policy?

- The individual is hired and paid directly by the employer (i.e., the person is not paid through subcontract with the service provider).
- Employment takes place in work settings where the majority of employees do not have disabilities.
- The position is an individual job (i.e., not a group or enclave setting).

This definition is similar to the definition of competitive integrated employment, as defined in <u>Get the Facts #1</u>.

### What does Employment First mean for transitioning youth and their families in Massachusetts?

• When planning for adult services, every effort should be made to encourage youth to consider employment before consideration of other options.

- Assistance and support to obtain integrated, individual employment should always be an expectation.
- Employment First does not mean you need to pursue employment right away when transitioning from school to adult services. While integrated, individual employment is prioritized, DDS continues to offer a variety of day and employment services options, including group employment and Community-Based Day Services. These services can support youth on their pathway to competitive integrated employment through exploration of work interests and skill development while providing structured programming on a regular schedule.
